What is Participatory Program Design?

Drawing from **Program Logic, theories of change, Outcome Mapping** and in the context of **complexity**, the training will map out the key steps of participatory approaches to design your project or program. The training covers the key theoretical trends in international development program design, monitoring and evaluation. Students will learn practical methods and tools to work in teams, with partners and stakeholders. **Program logic** has come from the field of evaluation and is called 'clarification evaluation' as it maps out the program's design and clarifies the program through an interrogation of its logic i.e. will our activities actually lead to the desired outcomes and impact. **Outcome Mapping** is a participatory alternative to a Logical Framework that acknowledges complexity and focuses effort with our partners. This approach to program design forms the backbone of a monitoring and evaluation framework. The type of evaluation it uses is theory driven and evidence based.

What will be covered in the Course?

The training emphasizes a focus on people and how to work with our partners and stakeholders in a participatory way. Stakeholders and program staff develop the program design together. This leads to stakeholders and staff having a shared and unified understanding of the program.

This three day training presents program design in a participatory way through practical examples and exercises. The training is designed for active learning. At the end of the training the participants will:

- Understand key theoretical trends in international development
- Understand how Participatory Program Logic & Outcome Mapping work
- Understand the importance of mapping outcomes
- Articulate the change theory underlying programs
- Understand the importance on focusing on outcomes with partners
- Have developed some basic program designs (Maps)
- Understand how program design can be used in a participatory way to build your team and stakeholder relationships and engagement.

Monitoring and Evaluation Framework:

- Understand how program maps form the backbone of a Monitoring and Evaluation framework
- Understand how monitoring can be used for organizational learning and change
- Develop a basic monitoring framework focused on building teams and partner relationships
- Explore a number of practical monitoring and evaluation tools and methods including MSC

What is the Most Significant Change Technique?

The Most Significant Change technique is a dynamic qualitative and participatory monitoring and evaluation method. Through collecting stories of the impact of our program with the program stakeholders we analyse our work. Through this process of selecting the stories, change management and organizational learning is facilitated. MSC has a particular ability to capture impact in complex cross cultural social change contexts.

With the shift in monitoring and evaluation to a mixed methods approach MSC is a method that fills the gap in data collection. MSC gathers rich qualitative data that captures intangible impact and unexpected outcomes of the program.

This two day training presents MSC through practical examples and exercises. The training is designed for active learning.

At the end of the training the participants will:

- Understand how MSC works
- Understand how MSC fits into a Monitoring and Evaluation Framework,
- Know the best situation to use MSC and when not to use MSC
- Understand how MSC facilitates development of stakeholder relationships and organizational learning & development
- Have learnt through practical exercises, skills to undertake MSC (story collection, story selection & feedback)
- Know the specific adaptation of MSC for an Indonesian context
- Have designed an MSC system for your program.
